"Missional what??"

As a denomination standing in the Reformed tradition, missional discipleship is already in the DNA of the United Reformed Church. As a denomination we are well placed to accommodate and nurture such a movement.

Walking the Way: Living the life of Jesus today

Celebrating Growing Leaders

What does it take to give leadership in a local church? Have you got what it takes? Do you know someone who has? Are you thinking "Someone needs to do it...."

'Growing Leaders' is a course spread over ten months that helps people think about what leadership is and whether God is calling them and gifting them to give leadership in their local church.

Over thirty people across Northern Synod are currently doing the course. They say: "I am excited about the journey....", "Learning about Jesus' style of leadership is interesting....", "Lots to ponder on....", "I am learning about my relationship with God and I hope, with God's help, to develop as a leader."

The course has ten sessions, run in different venues across the Synod, including a 24-hour residential (subsidised by Synod).

There are exercises for self-reflection but no written assignments.


In a time of rapid change all church structures have to hold in creative tension both stability and innovation. There has to be confidence that we have what we need and a willingness to take risks to create something new.
