Dear Friends

We've just come back from three weeks away and what a difference we've seen. Before we went I had been looking at the verges on the A689 and wondering where the beautiful swathes of wild flowers that we've seen were. Surely the council hadn't given up on something that has brought so much pleasure over the last couple of years?

On Sunday morning I was preaching at Stockton and drove out of town. What a delight it was to see the flowers along my route; they had been there all the time and I had been too impatient to see them.

In the book of Ecclesiastes the most famous words are probably these "To everything there is a season and a time for every purpose under heaven". These words are well known, particularly if you, like me, are a child of the sixties and we learned them from the Byrds' recording "Turn, Turn, Turn" released in 1965.

We were with a group of similarly aged oldies on our recent holiday, a Saga group travelling from Amsterdam down the Rhine and the Danube to the Black Sea. It was interesting to hear what the guides in each town and city we visited said about their countries and the situations in them.

The further east we went, the more the history of each country brought home to me what a different experience we have had being an island nation with fixed borders. There were tales of all the many groups who had invaded and seized power, particularly during and after the Second World War. As one very interesting guide in Hungary said, "The Russians liberated us from the Nazis but then forgot to go home – for 40 years!"

The interesting thing was the question of the Church. In countries dominated by the Communists or by dictators, the Church had definitely been regarded as the opiate of the people. To say going to church was discouraged is to put it mildly. To do so meant an end to your career, particularly if you were someone of influence like a doctor or teacher. Now the times have turned and going to church has become desirable, even fashionable and adults are being baptised so they can marry in church.

The question now is- is this a good thing for faith? The Church has survived through persecution and people have struggled to keep the faith. What will happen now there is no struggle?

I hope that the seeds and shoots kept alive through the difficult days will now come to full flower. Certainly there were signs of churches being restored and even being rebuilt, but as we know church is not a building. Perhaps a bit of persecution would do us all good, rather than the indifference that usually meets us in our country, so that we have to consider what is important.

I do hope your holidays give you something new to consider. Happy Summer! Chris

Prayer Time

George Robert Parkinson

The service contained a reading of a letter to George by one of his young friends who regarded George as an honorary grandfather. In it she told George exactly what he had always meant to her as she grew up. The following is Maranny's tribute to George on behalf of us all.

That letter summed George up perfectly and the illustration on the front of the service sheet is Just George, rarely without a smile and full of mischief.

For the last ten years I have been an honorary member of the St George's family and it is right that



as a family together we celebrate the life of George Robert Parkinson. I only found out he had a middle name last week but to me he will always be our George. To celebrate his life we have to go back a fair bit and as Wyn was always there loving and supporting him, what better time than when George and Wynne met. They met like many young couples in the fifties, at the cinema, The Odeon in Hartlepool in 1955. The attraction grew and George always got what he wanted and they married in this church in October 1958, which means next year would have been their Diamond wedding. From beginning to end George and Wyn supported each other through thick and thin, and from one place to another as they certainly moved about a great deal over the years. I am so glad they settled back in Hartlepool eventually as what a lot we would have missed without them.

George served an apprenticeship as a joiner, although he wanted to be a butcher, but his dad thought a joiner was a safer trade. George ended up cutting wood rather than meat.

He should have done national service but joined the army as a corporal in the Royal Military Police. I know he had fond memories of this time as he often reminisced about that time in our Thursday Hobbies group.

After passing out, George was posted to Singapore accompanied by Wyn. Singapore had different memories for George as it is there Janet their infant daughter is buried in a war commission cemetery. The third red rose on the coffin is for Janet and rightly so.

After Singapore George and Wyn continued to move around. Next step was Retford Barracks, Edinburgh, then on to France and the Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Powers in Europe- Shape for short. Then Chelmsford in Essex. And finally back to Hartlepool in 1972. Safely back here in Hartlepool George took up his trade of joiner and Wyn ran an off licence just round the corner from Milton Road where they moved to in 1978.

George was very much a family man and a much loved uncle. In the different places he lived he made friends, as he couldn't help it. He warmed to people and people warmed to him. He had a wicked sense of humour and many here will bear witness to that mischievous glint in his eye when something amused him, I have it on good authority that Bil,I who read the 23rd psalm, and George had to be separated as they egged each other on.

In the short time I have It is difficult to celebrate all of George's gifts, but he was an accomplished artist although he would-be modest about it. This is one of George's of Holy island that I watched grow at Hobbies. Obviously this is even more precious to me now.

George would be the first to acknowledge that his sister Barbara taught him a great deal as he attended her art class in Billingham

He made fabulous Ginger wine and raised a lot of money for the Church here with his ginger wine stall at the Christmas Fair.

He embraced new technology and spent a great deal of time on his computer researching family history and he helped anyone and everyone who asked for his help with finding out about their past- myself included.

Wyn and George always seemed to be going off somewhere, visits to family, there always seemed to be a weddings on the horizon in recent years and they did enjoy holidays, Scotland being a favourite,

George knew early this year that his time left here was limited and faced the fact with his usual down to earthness, my apologies to English teachers. We all hoped he would be with us just a bit longer and were disappointed that he wasn't able to celebrate his 80th birthday in Northumberland as planned but he did have a great day with family, his sister Barbara, and brother Stephen, their other halves and of course Wyn. I know because he told me so just a few days afterwards.

George meant a lot to me, When I had a lot to learn leading worship here, he told me "Just focus on me and you will be all right." I did and I am.

A devoted husband, a family man, a great friend, a talented artist. A committed member of this church family.and I could go on and on. What will I remember George for most? All of these but most of all his sense of humour and that wicked glint in his eye. If you have smiled this morning then George who is only a thought away will be smiling back. I guarantee it.

Commitment changes lives - Commitment for Life remembers 25 years of being part of the mission of the United Reformed Church.

25 years is a long time to be in a partnership. Can you remember what you were doing in 1992?

Bosnia Herzegovina declares independence and a 3 year war followed between Muslims, Serbs and Croats prompting UN intervention

Signing of the Maastricht treaty on 7th February which founded the European Union Euro Disney opens in France

Bill Clinton becomes U.S. president

Rioting by local youth breaks out across cities including Bristol

US refuses to sign The UN convention on Climate Change and Biological Diversity in Rio de Janeiro

Fire damages a major part of Windsor Castle and a number of important works of art, books and furniture are lost

The Summer Olympics are held in Barcelona, Spain

Rioting breaks out in Los Angeles following the acquittal of four white police officers accused of beating black motorist Rodney King.

Violence flares in Germany against Immigrants blaming them for economic problems.

And on the television you might have been watching: One Foot in the Grave, The Crystal Maze, Casualty or Inspector Morse

AND The General Assembly of the United Reformed Church, in York, commended Commitment for Life to churches as a way of putting their faith into action. Having previously been known as The 1% Appeal, which encouraged Christians to give 1% of their disposable income to aid development, it would now tell stories of how the money was being used and help congregations understand about the structures that keep people poor and how to bring justice for all.

Today, Commitment for Life is firmly embedded in the mission of the church and has raised millions of pounds to help people rise out of poverty and live fulfilled lives. It has also changed the lives of those who have visited partners or heard them speak in their churches. Rev John Marsh has shared a memory from his trip with Commitment for Life to Zimbabwe in 2011. "The kindness of her neighbours, and the visits by the nurse from the Clinic, supported by funds from Christian Aid and Commitment for Life, were Maureen's only dying comfort and solace. "Thank you for coming to see me", she said.

These utterly poor people have nothing. So they make something out of nothing. It's what they do.

If, in the years since our visit, all had become well for Zimbabwe and its people, we could rejoice that the need was no longer there. Sadly, but truly, little has changed for the better and Commitment for Life's active participation with Christian Aid is urgently necessary going forward.

Where there is nothing, we need to continue to do, and be, something gracious and miraculous for God and for God's people."

'So you see, faith by itself isn't enough.'(James 2:17) James wrote his epistle not with the intention of telling people how to become a Christian but rather how to act like one. James sees faith and works as integral to each other.

Thank you for being a Commitment for Life Church and raising funds last year. Thank you for engaging with issues, retelling stories and praying for partners. Your gifts have made a real difference over the last 25 years but there is still so much more to do.

Friends of Bethel Nursery School

For many years now St George's have been supporters of the charity Friends of Bethel Nursery which was introduced to us by Margaret Messer, Elsie Grainger's daughter. This has helped build a nursery school in Banjul, capital of the Gambia.

It opened in September 2011 with sixty 3 year old children and these have graduated, many of them moving on to primary education.

The trustees have considered the future of the charity and have reluctantly decided to close the charity, though this does not mean an end to the school. The objective to build the new school has been successfully achieved and many other resources have been provided.

There often comes a time when charities need to consider whether their initial idea has gone as far as the trustees can deal with and this is the decision that the trustees of FBNS have come to.

The charity will wind up next year in accordance with the requirements of the Charity Commission and until then the charity will continue to provide for lunches, books, cleaning materials and equipment and maintaining the building.

Margaret has sent a letter explaining why and what is happening and also thanks St. George's for the tremendous support which has been given over the years.

It will be on the notice board at the back of church and you are all invited to read it.


