

Dear Friends

One of the books I go back to again and again at this time of year is The Things He Carried, by Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Chelmsford. He was Bishop of Reading when he wrote this book.

In the book Bishop Stephen talks about the things Jesus carried with him to the cross.

The crown of thorns – a symbol of Kingship and yet it pierced his scalp and made him bleed. It was put on his head to make fun of him. They didn't want to identify with Jesus as a King, yet they made him a crown and bowed down in worship as they mocked him.

They made him a robe, like the robe a high priest might war, seamless, light and expensive and yet his sweat and blood would stain the fabric.

He carried his followers' disappointments, for they had high expectations of where he would lead them and now it seemed to be coming to nothing.

He carried hopes and, sorrows, the broken hearts of the people and took them to the cross.

And still he carries our sorrows and our broken hearts and our hopes and our dreams not just through Lent and into Easter so that we can carry all that we are to him.

The book ends with a prayer which includes these words;

Help is to follow in his way, deny ourselves and take up the cross he gives us, that the world may learn his way of peace;

may his life and his purpose be alive in us this day and may we be alive in him.

As we approach the season of Easter, may we look to the cross and remember all that our God has done for us in Christ.

35th Hartlepool (St George's) Scout Group

For their Safety Badge the Beavers have been learning about fire safety in the home, road safety and "Say no to Strangers". Currently the Beavers are making Mother's Day cards and Easter cards.

The Cubs are working towards their "Global Issues" badge, and as part of this they identified the emblems of several charities such as British Red Cross, Water Aid, Save the Children, and Médecin sans Frontières and said what they understood about the work of those charities. For their First Aid badge they learnt CPR, how to put a patient in the recovery position, and how to apply different bandages. As well as doing badge work, the Beavers and Cubs enjoy playing team games and the Cubs also enjoyed playing a game of 'Beetle'.

Cycle Idai Devastates Eastern Zimbabwe

At least 89 people have died in Zimbabwe after Cyclone Idai tore across the eastern and southern parts of the country. Idai has deepened the suffering of a nation already grappling with economic and ecological woes. (probably and understatement of casualties, but this is what I got from CforL last week Ed.)

The scale of destruction is unprecedented. Chimanimani has been cut off. Torrential rains and 170km winds swept away roads, homes, bridges and knocked out power and communication lines.

Nick Mangwana, the secretary for ministry of information, confirms 89 deaths. Most affected areas are not yet accessible, with high winds and dense clouds hampering rescue flights. Two pupils and a worker at a secondary school in Chimanimani were among those killed. A boulder crashed into their dormitory. Soldiers helped rescue the surviving 200 pupils and staff trapped at the school.

Zimbabwe, a country of 15 million people, is already suffering. The UN estimates that 5.3 million people will require food aid. Christian Aid is well positioned to compassionately respond to crises such as this.

From the Church Meeting



The Church Meeting on Sunday 24th March was not a particularly happy one. There was the usual friendly family atmosphere, but the news was not good, particularly the end of year accounts which showed that we are really living beyond our means,

In David Copperfield, Mr Micawber has his famous, and oft-quoted, recipe for happiness:

"Annual income twenty pounds, annual expenditure nineteen [pounds] nineteen [shillings] and six [pence], result happiness. Annual income twenty

pounds, annual expenditure twenty pounds ought and six, result misery."

Unfortunately our accounts are nearer the second than the first and we really need to do something about it. We have a large deficit on the year and we need to turn this around. We are a hardy, cheerful lot who love our church and there is no doubt we can do this if we put our minds to it. However, as all debt counsellors know, you need to get things square before you can really tackle the problem.

In short, we need to see if we can wipe out the deficit. As it happens, April 23rd is St. George's Day and we traditionally celebrate this as our gift day. Our elders have suggested, that if we can afford it, we make a pledge of a gift of money to St. George's. Envelopes and forms were available at the meeting- and Sandra and Margaret still have some. The idea is that you return this on, or before Gift Day with either your gift (probably a cheque) or pledge for a future date. This is meant to be a one off gift- like a birthday present, not a regular occurrence, though it would delight the treasurer if you increased your weekly giving!

Let us make clear, you are not expected to do this, it is a gift freely given. Different people are in different circumstances at different times in their lives and only you know yours.

If you would like to do this, please ask for an envelope.

What's the URC all about?


Do you really know what makes the URC different from other denominations? You may have been a member for a while or be a new one but not be entirely sure.


You can learn much more by discussing things in a group and we already have one person who is trying to struggle with this course on her own. Would you like to join her?

A Rubbish Evening

The Peace and Justice group has being trying for months to arrange a meeting about recycling- what and where. Finally, in February, a representative from the Council came and gave an interesting talk and answered questions. So are we now clear what and where?

No easy answer, really, though some things were made clear. Envelopes, which started the whole discussion, can be recycled, unless there is too much glue, in which case, just tear off that bit and recycle the rest. Black plastic is a no-no in Hartlepool as the machinery which sorts it cannot see it on a black conveyer belt. If you live in Durham, you can recycle it. On the whole, hard plastic, which has the recycle symbol, can be put in your recycling bin, but the thin film which wraps many magazines can't. Things like bread wrappers can be recycled in supermarkets who take carrier bags for recycling.

Pizza boxes, if not too greasy are ok, but not egg boxes as they are made with too much glue. Confused? If you aren't sure, put it in the rubbish bin as it costs a lot to fish things out from the recycling- but DON'T take this as an excuse not to recycle.

Really, the government needs to act by banning some plastics in packaging, but they seem a bit pre-occupied by other things at the moment to do something which really is important.

St George's would like to become an eco-church and we all need to play a part in this. If you are throwing something in the bin in the kitchen, ask yourself if it can be recycled. If it can- take it home. Do you need to use a throwaway cup. It's more eco to wash up- and sociable too. Basically, use your brain and care about the environment; we'd like to leave a decent planet for our grand-kids.
