


# Newsletter of St. George's URC Hartlepool Nov-Dec 2021

It was T.S Eliot who wrote "April is the cruellest month" in his poem "The Waste Land", but I rather think that November has the edge. At least Thomas Hood wasn't impressed by it in his poem "November". It might seem like Autumn at the beginning, but it is the dying days of Autumn by the end of the month, when the leaves are off the trees and are now becoming a sodden mass instead of a crisp carpet that rustles when you walk through them.

It's no wonder that November is a month for remembering the dead. Obviously, it's the month when we celebrate, if that's the word, the end of the First World War. This was also called the Great War, not because there was anything wonderful about it, but because never before had so many nations been involved in a conflict nor so many people died. Never before had there been so many families involved or so much need to build memorials to the fallen, whether in the air, the sea, the land and all those other people who played their part without getting the glory. It's "glory" because we have to put a big spin on it. In reality there was no glory in the mud and the blood as is shown in the work of the poets who survived to the end.

Now, of course we have victims of many later conflicts to remember; just look at the number of petals that fall on the bowed heads of those assembled for the Festival of Remembrance in the Albert Hall.

This year, the first time we have been gathered together in churches for a Remembrance Service for all since the pandemic began, we will also be remembering those people who are not with us this year. These are members of our church family and friends – and we miss them.

It is no coincidence that November ends with looking forward to better things. The end of November is also the beginning of Advent when, with the lighting of an extra candle every week, we move towards the light. At the same time, symbolic of our movement to the light, Mary and Joseph begin their journey to Bethlehem and the birth of their baby who would be, literally The Light of the World. In our time of gloom, let us give thanks that we are people of the light and that the new birth of Jesus brings life for us all- present and past.

#### Ann Foster 1934-2021

Ann was Hartlepool born and bred, the second in a family of six children, with four brothers and one sister. Church played a prominent part in her life with Ann attending Sandringham Rd Presbyterian Church, the family church where she sang in the choir. As a child, Ann was evacuated to Whitby as were many children because of the war. It only lasted for 3 months as Ann's mum fetched her back but it must have been a very unsettling occurrence as



she told the story of it when she had forgotten so much else.

Ann went to the High School, where she made, and kept lots of friends. This seems to have been one of her great talents as she still has friends she has known for years. From the High School, at the age of 16, she joined the tax office, then in Clifton Avenue, a job she held until the birth of Graeme.

She met Stan through mutual friends. Her friend Margo was courting her young man and his friend was Stan. They all used to go out cycling, riding tandem and I suppose you could say they rode tandem for the rest of their lives! They married in 1955 and two years later along came Graeme, followed in 1961 by Gillian. The family went to St John's, Park Rd- Sandringham Rd had joined them in1958 – and when they joined together with St George's, that became their church. They both played a big part in the life of the church, Ann being a Sunday School teacher for a while and always being there when needed, though she never wanted the spot-light.

Ann, along with many other young women of her generation, joined St Luke's Young Mothers' Club. Again, many friends she made there were friends for life. It far outlasted the title Young Mothers and it became a social affair when they didn't need child-rearing help.

Ann had quite a varied life and interests. Her talent with numbers led to a job at Sportskit where she did the books, as she did for L&P Motors, where Stan worked. At one point she even manned the tea trolley at the FE College! She also helped as a volunteer with the Samaritans which takes a special sort of person.

Ann loved gardening. She was delighted when they moved to Eamont Gardens and she became the gardener while Stan became the groundsman- he loved his lawn. Even when Ann moved to the Sycamores, she continued her interest to the last, still wanting to deadhead the flowers when physically it was very difficult.

She was a wizard Scrabble player and none of the family really wanted to play with her as they knew they'd be beaten. Most of all, she loved reading and would always have her nose in a book. It often conflicted with cooking which really was not her favourite thing. She cooked because she had to, she read because she loved it. Potatoes would boil dry because Ann was engrossed in a book. She would merely suggest the family scraped the burnt bits off. A woman after my own heart. Gillian still can't look a jam tart in the face!

I remember Ann as a tall, elegant woman and it was a trouble when her hips made walking difficult. Although her mobility made life difficult, Ann always liked going out for a coffee, though it was probably the company she enjoyed, rather than the drink. Until Covid brought a break to it, Gillian brought her mum to the Hobbies Club here on a Thursday morning and she enjoyed a good chat, though her old hobby of knitting proved impossible.

Ann was part of the family- the one that was Graeme and Gillian and their other halves and their children and grandchildren, and also part of the church family here at St George's and the wider one of her friends. She will leave a huge hole in all of them.


## .Poverty Facts: Zimbabwe

• Poverty affects <u>76.3% of Zimbabwean</u> <u>children</u> living in rural areas.

Roughly 74% of the population lives on £5.00 a day and the <u>average wage per</u> month is around £230.

- Half of Zimbabwe's 13.5 million people live below the food poverty line. About 3.5 million children are chronically hungry.
- Approximately 1.3 million Zimbabweans were living with HIV as of 2016. However,

the number of HIV cases has been declining since 1997 because of improved prevention, treatment and support.



- Due to famine and the HIV/AIDS crisis, the average life expectancy for a Zimbabwean was only 61 years as of 2018. However, life expectancy has steadily risen since 2002 when it was only 44 years. In 2019, two million Zimbabweans had no access to safe drinking water due to drought.

Commitment for Life has supported Christian Aid's work in Zimbabwe for decades. Sometimes is feels like just a drop in the ocean, but for tens of thousands of Zimbabweans, your prayers, advocacy, and generosity can be the difference between life and death. Thank you for your support!

#### A brief report from the Synod Meeting held on 16<sup>th</sup> October 2021 via Zoom

The morning began with worship followed by a bible study led by Rev Rosalind Selby, the Principal of Northern College, based on Mark Chapter 1 verses 14 and 15. She also outlined various opportunities for spiritual development within the college, some of which are online.

The Synod is working towards a Joint Safeguarding Committee with the Yorkshire Synod.

A report from the URC (Northern Province) Trust Limited informed the meeting of the way in which the URC planned to address the major deficit in the URC Ministers pension fund. This would potentially mean a contribution from the Trust of £3 million over 9 years.

The Pastoral Committee reported on the call of several new ministers in the Synod. Lay presidency training is provided by the Ministries and Development Committee. Refresher training is needed every 6 years for those in this role.

The convenor for the Children and Youth Work Committee reported on a new strategy that they are developing to re-ignite our approach to children and youth work.

2022 sees the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the formation of the URC. A resource pack will be available to churches from January and several celebratory events are already planned across the denomination.

Our own Chris Eddowes is the Commitment for Life advocate for Synod and she reminded us of the upcoming COP26 meeting in Glasgow.

The meeting then moved on to patterns of ministry – the way forward to 2025, when Northern Synod would have an allocation of 12 ministers of word and sacrament (we presently have 9 ministers in post which includes the Synods mission enabler).

A discussion followed on how this would work out in practice. These changes will require an alteration in the expectation of both ministers and congregations to avoid stress and overload. It was noted that ministry is constantly evolving and there would need to be a willingness to think creatively. This change would need to be discussed at local church level before the next Synod meeting on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2022 when a resolution will be presented.


The Moderator announced he would be stepping down when his current term expires in 2 years time
