

Dear Friends,

In April we went on a wonderful three week cruise in the Mediterranean. We sailed from Portsmouth to Antalya in Turkey and back again via various places like Crete, Cyprus, Rhodes, Malta and Sicily among others. The thing we realised as we sailed was that St Paul had been there centuries before us. In fact, he went to many more places, but at least it took him 4 journeys!

I've always thought that Paul must have been very difficult to get on with; there's certainly no evidence of anything approaching humour. But he was the perfect man for the job he was chosen for. First of all, he was not afraid to realise he was wrong- see the road to Damascus. He was brave- stand where he did in Ephesus and preach what he did to an audience whose livings depended on a pagan god and you'll see what I mean. The weather was rough when we were in the Med and you could feel it on a ship carrying 1,000 people so imagine what it was like in a much smaller one- and he was shipwrecked!

He was resourceful. He used an altar to an unknown god to talk about the one they didn't know. He used his Roman citizenship when it was convenient and his Jewish knowledge of the scriptures to address new groups in new places.


He was commanding, taking charge when the ship was foundering so that everyone was saved. He wasn't afraid of hard work, supporting himself by his trade of tentmaking when he stayed for any length of time. He was persuasive- he must have been to have founded so many churches, and then he kept in touch with them all, helping solve problems that arose. He must have been tireless. The distances were huge even though not as breakneck as they seem when you read about them; he did stay for quite a while in several places. He knew when it was time to leave and was pretty good at escaping from tricky situations.

The followers of Jesus in Damascus thought God must have got the wrong person. You couldn't blame them. It just proves the point that He knows best!

I lost count of the times we were told about Paul's exploits by guides and the number of St Paul's Bays where he landed or was shipwrecked. It seemed strange to be following in so many of his footsteps. I'm still not sure I would have found him easy to know, but then, that's not the point. I do know that my admiration grew as we went along and I found myself re-reading Acts. Perhaps I'll go on more journeys in his footsteps.

Bad Samaritan

Campaigners worry that the government's new Illegal Migrations Bill threatens to tear up the 1951 UN Refugee Convention, to which the UK was a signatory. "The UK's draconian asylum system divides families and ravages the mental and physical health of some of the world's most vulnerable people," says Global Justice Now. "There is no 'illegal' way to claim asylum."

Asylum is different to economic migration. Asylum seekers are protected under international law, and the UK has strict guidelines for the latter. The Joint Public Issues Team organised a response to the introduction of the Illegal Migration Bill, that reflected the parable of the Good Samaritan. It summarised the awfulness of the Bill by stating,

"If ever there was a contemporary example of ignoring our neighbour and walking by on the other side, this is it." https://jpit.uk/response-to-illegal -migration-bill

Events

St. George's is pleased to be welcoming The Guisborough Choral Society on **Saturday the 17**th **June** to perform excerpts (the best bits) from Handel's Messiah. This concert will be conducted by Rebecca Johnson and will feature Chris Haresnape playing the church organ. This will be a matinée concert on Saturday the 17th beginning at 2:00 pm everyone is welcome. Tickets are £10 and are available from Enid, Paul or Gillian and of course from the CAB next door to the church. You can also pay at the door when you arrive; doors open at 1:30 pm. Under 16 years of age tickets are free.



In the last newsletter we talked about the grand piano that we were hoping to obtain for use during concerts in the church. Initially the thoughts were that we would move the grand piano from the Hartlepool Town Hall into the church but as many of you will know during the COVID pandemic there was water ingress into the town hall, and this has significantly damaged the body and soundboard of the piano. Estimates for repair of this instrument are somewhere in the region of £30,000. Although this repair should be or should have been covered by insurance within the town hall or by the Borough Council, we decided that it was more sensible to look elsewhere for a piano that would be suitable for St. George's. Thanks to Paul Humberston and a chance conversation with Ray Elliston from Grange Road Methodist Church we discovered that the piano formerly belonging to Betty Thompson was potentially going to be homeless later in the autumn. At the moment St. George's and the Hartlepool Music Society have expressed a wish to relocate this piano to St. George's and as I write this, we are confident that that will happen. This piano is slightly smaller than the grand from the Town Hall but we are confident that it will fit in well in St George's.

It would be good to have a series of concerts during the summer months but it becomes rather impractical based on the fact that holidays tend to get in the way for many people organising and attending so with this in mind it is likely that after the concert of Handel's Messiah we will have a break until our next concert which is scheduled for the 11th October featuring Hayley McKay who is a country and western singer who has appeared in the Grand Old Opry in Nashville, at Glastonbury and also in music festivals up and down the country. Hayley is an exceptional talent and we are pleased to welcome her to St. George's. The concert is a Wednesday evening and will be part of a country-wide tour that Hayley will be undertaking. Tickets will be available closer to the event in St George's and also online from our usual ethical ticket supplier

<u>www.brownpapertickets.com</u>. Buying tickets online is useful from the church's point of view as it helps us to know how many tickets have been sold for a particular event rather than having to anxiously await people walking through the doors at the time of the concert. It is also helpful for those who have to travel to concerts and are travelling in from out of the area.

After this concert in October we will be having our remembrance concert on **Saturday 11**th **November**. This is in the early stages of organising, more details will follow on this event. On **Saturday 9th December** of course we will have our annual Carols for Hartlepool concert featuring the Hartlepool Brass Band and this year we're hoping to welcome singer-songwriter Wendy Arrowsmith to perform at the concert as well. All the information regarding the concerts will be available on flyers, leaflets and posters. Information will also be available online on the Hartlepool St. George's Venue Facebook page and on the Hartlepool St. George's United Reformed Church website where we now have a new tab which includes the St. George's Venue.

St. George's website

Whilst browsing the other day I noticed that there were a few items on the St George's website that needed to be updated. With permission from the Elders I obtained the access information and have made a few changes to the St George's website. I hope that many of you will now dip in and have a



look and please come back to the Elders with feedback of whether you think the new website is more representative of St George's than you remember of the old.

This is where you can also obtain your digital copy of the church newsletter but there is now a tab available for the St George's Venue and this will be available for information regarding concerts in the church.

Sometimes we have concerts which are being organised under the umbrella of St. George's United Reformed Church and others which are being organised alongside St. George's Venue. I know this can be a little confusing and I understand that there are differences of opinions with regards to why we do this. St. George's must be proactive and there are certain areas where we have to be realistic and see that many people will be reluctant to come to a church but will be pleased to come to a concert even if it is in a church. It is with this in mind that we advertise some concerts as St George's United Reformed Church presents I hope this is clear.

Property Matters

The ripples of the quinquennial report are still being felt around St George's and we are currently in correspondence with a representative from Synod in relation to several items that have been cited as important and that we must rectify. Please speak to a member of the property committee for more information. We are looking at levelling the floor in the church where we created an access hole to repair the burst central heating pipes a few years ago. We need to do this so that we can move the piano (when it arrives) from its storage place in the transept to a more central place for concerts.

Discussions are still being undertaken in relation to the removal of the choir pews in front of the organ. If we are to attract large bands and orchestras to St George's, we need this are to be more practical. In June 2024 we have booked the Teesside Symphony Orchestra and with these pews in place, we will have to cancel this concert. Whilst we appreciate the vista will change, the benefits will be significant and will help when we are looking at bookings for the church and venue. Placing the Thompson chairs in this area will help to alleviate the empty space feeling without the pews. No decision has yet been made on this proposal.


We are also looking to upgrade the church lighting with modern LED lights. This could be undertaken during August if agreed and be available for the darker nights. These will save electricity and improve the church lighting. We are also looking at inadequacies in the theatrical lighting that have been identified during concerts and as funds are available, we will make changes to improve the visitor experience.
